HIKING TOURS

Barrow House include in our guest experience programme a series of Kerry Guided Walks that are suitable for all ages and fitness levels.





From easy walks in Killarney's National Park to moderate full day walks and strenuous walks of the classic climbs such as Irelands tallest mountain Carrauntoohil and the MacGillycuddy Reeks or lakes in Slieve Mish.

Experience the nearby lesser explored areas of County Kerry with guided walks designed and constructed by trained guides, who offer a wide range of tours from half day guided walks in Dingle to full days exploring the far reaches of County Kerry far from the throng of mainstream tourism.

Our Guides have chosen walking trails and routes that are off the beaten path and filled with history, legends and local characters.

Guides can also design a walk to suit your specific needs or fitness levels.

Walking sites and recommended day trips.

Ardfert - You are 1/2 way to Banna Strand, a long gorgeous stretch of very walkable beach.

Stop at the Cathedral in town or just outside of town is the old friary founded in the 13th century.

You are not likely to encounter any living souls there and will feel transported back in time.

Stop at Kate Brown's for lunch, great atmosphere! They have live music some nights, but they start late. Call ahead to find out.

Kerry Head - (The closest scenic walk from the house.)

About a 25 min drive to Ballyheigue. (Stop at Clara's for some tea and wonderful scones overlooking Ballyheigue Strand.)

From Ballyheigue, stay on the coastal route heading west out to the end of the peninsula.

You will pass through Glenderry, keeping the water on your left and eventually you'll see a turnoff to the left

that says "cul de sac", turn there and take that to the end. You will find at the end of the road on your right a farm,

pull in there and park along the side or behind in the back.

There's an unpaved road you will take heading away from the farm which leads out to a scenic pasture with ocean views.

When you come to the trail marker that leads you right and uphill, go LEFT down to the cliff edge,

a gorgeous spot to view the sea and cliffs. Then you can continue back up the path and up the hill.

This eventually leads to the road you drove in on, unless you choose to walk the whole Kerry Head (about 3 hours).

The shorter hike is only maybe one hour and well worth it!

Ballybunion cliff walk - If the weather permits, carry on up to Ballybunion and do the cliff walk there.

Very easy going. It overlooks a beach with caves and wonderful rock formations.

If the tide is out and you're adventurous, there's a path down, over the fence on the far side with a rope assist at the bottom.

(It's really much more doable than it first appears!) Just keep an eye on the tide!

Finish your day at one of the towns great restaurants.

Daroka and Strollers Bistro have been recommended.

Inch Beach day trip -

Inch Beach is ironically gigantic and you can park your car right on the beach.

It's a beautiful spot to see either on your way to or from Annascaul.

On the way to or from Inch Beach / Annascaul..

The Pheonix Restaurant - REALLY worth a visit to this fabulous mostly vegetarian enclave, eatery.

You'll find sleeping cats, gardens bursting with colour and texture, fairy houses and old tinker wagons!

They grow a lot of their own vegetables and herbs on site.

The food is outstanding, (try the fish pie!) homemade breads, soups, curries!

They also often have live music, look them up online for a schedule.

Annascaul - "The Dingle Way"

Don't' forget to visit the famous South Pole Inn where Ireland's Antarctic explorer Tom Crean is celebrated.

From the main St. N86, take lower main St. which turns into Church.

The trail head is less than a mile up on your right. You can park there on the side of the road.

You walk through pasture and up the hillside to a stunning panoramic view of Irish farmland and cliff-lined seacoast.

Annascaul Lake - Stunning spot to view the glacial lake at the base of several steep slopes, a nice picnic spot as well, or just take the fantastic country drive that takes you there and back.

The road is just past the South Pole Inn on your right as you are heading toward Dingle.

Dingle Town, Slea Head drive, Dun Chaoin (Quinn) and the Great Blasket Islands -

Definitely do not miss the drive around Slea Head and a visit to the The Blasket Centre +353 66 915 6444 (heritage center and museum that gives the history of the villagers who settled this remote and ruggedly beautiful island. It is extremely well done and very interesting to see).

If the weather is fair, "good-on'ya!" as they say.

Catch the ferry from Dun Chaoin (on Slea head drive) and spend the day circumavigating the island or hanging on the gorgeous beach with the seals.

It is an unforgettable Irish experience!

You can check with the tourist office in Dingle town to see if / when the ferries are running. Tel 353 66 915 1188. Or call Steven one of the ferry company operators at 353-87-743-5442.

Ballydavid Head - North of Dun Chaoin - "A wild and spectacular cliff walk"

Definitely worth climbing the cliff to sit amongst the Napoleonic era ruins of a lookout post.

Take the R559 from Dun Chaoin into Murreagh. There is a pub on the left side that may be able to give you directions where to park. There is a small beach in the area, above which there is a non-descript parking area.

You can just begin walking the cliffs up to the ruins and return or make a loop of it.

The trail is easy to follow once you get to it. Luck of the Irish to you!

Lakes of Killarney - Killarney is the start of the Ring of Kerry and where all the golfers congregate - beware!

It is definitely a tourist town. Our popular thing to do is rent bikes, head out of town and bike through the national park.

Great paths around Muckross lake.

The Gap of Dunloe is a stunning spot, a narrow pass between mountains that contains 5 lakes.

You can stop at Ross castle on your way to or from town and take a row boat out for a spin.

If biking is not your thing, definitely drive through the park either way. Take the N71 (Moll's Gap is a cool spot for tea).

At the other end of the drive, you can end up in Kenmare,

a perfect Irish village with the best food in western Ireland (so they say) great shops and pleasant atmosphere.

We hear the Guinness is good...and good for you.

The Maharees - On the north side of the Dingle peninsula, maybe a 40 min drive from the house, (take N86 to the R560) into Castlegregory – there's a great outdoor lunch spot here. (Spillane's has great fish stew and other seafood.)

During the warmer months you can rent kayaks, paddle boards and paddleboats at the beach, also some surfing on the other side of the island. Any of the water sports companies can tell you all about it. This is also a great spot to walk the cliff dunes. The beach there has the most beautiful rocks. You may see the cows strolling along the beach. It's a beautiful spot on a glorious day, we hope you have one! (2 if you've the luck of the Irish!)

Glanteenassig Forest Park - You pass the road on your way to the Maharees, a wonderful spot to walk, picnic, take photos; and a fabulous drive there and back. A gorgeous little glacial lake with a pleasant and easy boardwalk around the lake.

Take the gravel road all the way to the carpark to do the boardwalk.

Then when exiting, go left out of the carpark and drive further up to a picnic spot where you'll get views of Tralee bay. There's another spot here not to miss. As you're driving out, there's a turn on your right side just as the road swings left. If you take the path it will lead you straight to a lake and a fairy glen by a beautiful stream.

Glanteenassig - Located on the Tralee side of Castlegregory.

There is a sign for it on the main road (R560) at Aughacasla. Turn left if heading out toward The Maharees.

There is a big brown sign on the left but its often overgrown by a hedge.

You will not think you're on the right road, keep going! After a 4km drive, you will reach the entrance on your right.

There are three parking lots - one at the entrance, one at the first lake, and one at the second lake.

I definitely suggest you park at one of the latter two, for the road up is a bit boring to walk.

Then it's magic revelation - misty and magical with moss covered trees, mountains, waterfalls, wildlife and three beautiful lakes.

Listowel - Famous for its Literary Festival each year in May.

But at any time of the year is worth a visit to this quaint Irish town to have a pint at John B. Keane's pub. The famous playwright has passed away but his son carries on the tradition of having the plays performed right there in the pub in the evenings. Call ahead for schedule. It's a wonderful thing to do and see.

Listowel Castle - Is worth a visit, right in town. They have a nice shop to visit as well.

Galway Day Trip - If you have the time, head the 3 hours north to Galway.

It's well worth seeing this world famous city and experiencing the fabulous food and music (everywhere!) as well as walking the canals and cobblestone streets. Plenty of shopping and history.

We recommend staying at Jurys Inn, right in the heart of everything.

Rent bicycles and ride along the waterfront and out to Salt Hill and beyond to Silverstrand beach.

You will have to share the road and it can be quite trafficky but there's a great bike path for most of the way.

If you're energetic, head on out to Furbogh for some fab seafood on the water at Padraicin's,


hopefully the weather allows you to sit outside!

Dela on lower Dominick St in the centre of town is wonderful for lunch. A charming spot.

They have their own organic farm just north of the city. The vegan platter is tasty and creative.

Don't let foul weather dampen your plans in Ireland, be prepared with fleece-lined rain gear and good comfortable walking shoes and you will have an unforgettable experience.



and we can chat with you about the options.



Stone steps are leading up to the main house door so you are advised that the house is not suitable for people with mobility issues or very young children.

and in a fit state to use our kayaks, Swimming area and SUP board.

When using any equipment and facilities available at Barrow House,

you must take care to safeguard your own health and safety and that of other people,

and you will be solely responsible for any loss or injury that you cause to yourself,

other persons or to the equipment or facilities to the extent that it is caused through your unsafe or improper use

of the equipment or facilities (including your use of them whilst under the influence of alcohol or medication)

or your failure to advise staff of a medical condition relevant to your use of the equipment or facilities.

Accidents and Injuries

We want all our members and guests to relax and enjoy the activities and facilities available at our House in safety.

Please be aware that as our House is set in open country with tides and elevated walls and boat deck and other natural features throughout our grounds that can be hazardous.

Members and their guests agree to observe the House rules and any signs published or displayed at our Houses at any time, only swim in a safe and cautious manner,

being aware of tidal flow and to take reasonable precautions when travelling around the grounds or using the facilities at the House. If a member or guest has an accident or suffers any injury at, or in the vicinity of, the House, please report this as soon as possible to a member of staff and in any event within 24 hours of the incident. As well as wanting to check on a guest's well-being, this information is needed in order to help us comply with our health and safety obligations and for insurance purposes.

Use of any of the lounge areas, screening room or facilities available at a House is entirely at the risk of a member or his or her guests.

Entering / leaving the house

All members and their guests are asked to respect our guests sleeping and nearby residents by being quiet when entering or leaving the House premises or while in the surrounding area.

Animals

No animals will be allowed in the House except for legally recognised and certified assistance dogs.

CCTV

Members and their guests be aware that for safety reasons, we use CCTV across all of our Houses.

Smoking

All guests are obligated to abide by the House's smoking policy then in effect and to all applicable no-smoking governmental laws, rules and regulations. No smoking (including e-cigarettes and vapes) is allowed inside the House at any time.

Barrow House reserves the right to prohibit or limit smoking in any area of the House premises at any time at its sole and absolute discretion.

Barrow House reserves the right to designate certain outside areas of the House premises as smoking areas and to change the location of such areas at any time however,

all residents and their guests are requested to respect the wishes of other guests with respect to smoking and to refrain from smoking when requested to do so.

Children

Barrow House is designed for adults, but aim to be child-friendly. Please be considerate of other guests when you bring children,
